Law Courses

Two routes for a career in law:

- Law Degree LLB
- Non-law Degree (eg BA, BSc) followed by "law conversion"

Law Degree

- Some Law degrees require LNAT National Admissions Test for Law an aptitude test
- Multiple choice comprehension and one essay
- Lnat.ac.uk
 - Register
 - Practice
- Dates: opens 1 August 2024, register early. Deadlines: Oxbridge 15 October, LSE 31 December.
- Only allowed to sit once.
- For example: Bristol: GCSE 20%, sixth form grades 40%, LNAT 40%.

Non-Law Degree

- Complete a three year degree, e.g History, English
- Different options from different instructions (previous Law conversion system no longer in place)
- One year course to prepare for the law, for example:
- University of Law Post Graduate Diploma in Law (PGDL) with SQE 1 preparation
- Nottingham Law School LLM Law course (including SQE 1 preparation)

After a university course in Law – "Lawyer"

<u>Solicitor</u>

- Solicitors Qualifying Exams (SQE1 and SQE2) (previous system known as Legal Practice Course "LPC")
- Various institutions: University of Law, BPP
- Two years training QWE Qualifying Work Experience. No longer has to be in one firm

• High street firm, In House, Corporate Law, Commercial Law.
